# MOOT PROPOSITION

IN THE SUPREME COURT OF BHARATAVARSH

Writ Petition (Civil) No. 214 of 2026

(Under Article 32 of the Constitution of Bharatavarsh)

Between

People for Heeravalli Protection & Ors.,

And

Union of Bharatavarsh & Ors.,

## FACTS OF THE CASE

1. The Heeravalli Hills constitute one of the oldest mountain ranges extending across several States of Bharatavarsh, including Aryadesh and Rajputana. The region plays a significant ecological role in groundwater recharge, climate moderation, prevention of desertification, and biodiversity conservation. Certain tracts within the Heeravalli range have, for several decades, been subjected to mining, agriculture, infrastructure projects, and urban expansion, while other areas remain ecologically sensitive.
2. Over the years, environmental experts, universities, and civil society organisations have expressed concerns regarding increasing anthropogenic pressure on the Heeravalli ecosystem. Multiple studies have identified specific pockets as environmentally fragile, while other areas have been consistently recorded as revenue land and subjected to non-forest use for over forty years.
3. In a series of judgments, this Hon'ble Supreme Court recognised the ecological importance of the Heeravalli Hills and, in certain cases, imposed restrictions on mining and construction activities in certain areas, including lands not formally notified as forest land. These decisions were based on ecological characteristics, irreversible environmental risk, and the precautionary principle.

# MOOT PROPOSITION

4. In 2025, a three-Judge Bench of this Hon'ble Court delivered its judgment in *Green Earth Forum v. Union of Bharatavarsh & Ors.* The Court held that statutory protection under the Forest Conservation Act, 1980, applies only to land formally notified or recorded as "forest" under applicable law. The Court observed that ecological sensitivity alone could not justify blanket judicial prohibitions on non-notified land and emphasised the need to balance environmental protection with economic development, infrastructure requirements, and policy choices made through democratic processes. The judgment underscored the doctrine of judicial restraint, noting that land-use policy and environmental governance primarily fall within the domain of the executive and legislature, subject to statutory compliance.
5. Following the judgment in *Green Earth Forum*, the State of Aryadesh, as part of a tourism promotion initiative, granted approval for the establishment of a Mega Water Theme Park over approximately 950 acres at the foothills of the Heeravalli range. The land in question was recorded as revenue land in official records for over four decades and had not been notified as forest land under any statute.
6. The proposed Water Theme Park included artificial water bodies, recreational facilities, hotels, and supporting infrastructure. Official project documents estimated the water requirement to be approximately five million litres per day, to be met through a combination of regulated groundwater extraction, treated wastewater reuse, and artificial recharge systems.
7. Around the same time, the State Government of Aryadesh granted permission to Moca-Cola Beverages Pvt. Ltd., a multinational beverage company, to establish a bottling and manufacturing unit in close proximity to the proposed theme park on the land recently acquired by it. The project was projected as a major investment initiative and part of a State-level regional development plan aimed at tourism promotion, employment generation, and economic diversification, and development of an arid and economically backward region. The unit was authorised to extract groundwater subject to regulatory limits and monitoring mechanisms.
8. Environmental clearances for both projects were granted by the State Environment Impact Assessment Authority (SEIAA) under the Environment (Protection) Act, 1986 and the EIA Notification, 2006. Public hearings were conducted as part of the clearance process. The state authorities maintain that all statutory requirements were complied with and that mitigation measures, including afforestation drives, water conservation systems, and groundwater recharge structures, were incorporated into the project design.

# MOOT PROPOSITION


9. In order to facilitate construction, land clearing and preparatory works were undertaken. It is alleged that approximately 1.8 lakh trees were felled, forest patches were cleared, and certain hill formations were altered to create access to roads and construction platforms. The Respondents contend that the compensatory afforestation was mandated, and tree felling permissions were granted in accordance with applicable laws.
10. Independent environmental impact studies conducted by universities and research institutions cautioned that the projects could adversely affect the groundwater levels, increase air pollution, accelerate desertification and lead to water scarcity in surrounding villages. Several villages in the surrounding area rely predominantly on groundwater for both drinking and agricultural purposes. Local residents claimed that groundwater levels have begun to decline following preliminary construction activity. Reports from local administrative authorities also indicated that certain habitations in the vicinity had been declared water-stressed during the preceding summer.
11. The Respondents relied on government-commissioned hydrological and environmental assessments as well as a High-Level Expert Committee report, which concluded that the project area did not fall within any notified forest or eco-sensitive zone; that groundwater extraction would remain within sustainable recharge limits; that artificial recharge and conservation measures would sufficiently mitigate environmental risks; and that a complete prohibition on development would adversely affect regional employment, tourism, and public revenue. However, the findings of the High-Level Expert Committee have been questioned by certain independent hydrologists and environmental scientists, who have expressed concerns regarding the methodology adopted and the long-term sustainability assumptions.
12. In response to the approvals, the local villagers, environmental activists, scientists, and civil society organizations organized peaceful protests, demonstrations, and sit-ins opposing the projects. During certain demonstrations, protestors blocked access roads leading to the project sites, affecting the movement of construction equipment, personnel, and public traffic.
13. The local administration detained several protest leaders for short durations, citing concerns relating to public order, obstruction of public roads, and safety considerations. The authorities stated that the measures were preventive, temporary, and proportionate. The protestors alleged that these detentions amounted to an unreasonable restriction on their fundamental rights under Articles 19(1)(a) and 19(1)(b) of the Constitution.

# MOOT PROPOSITION

14. It is further contented that substantial preparatory construction work commenced prior to final environmental approval and that public hearings were conducted without adequate disclosure of Environmental Impact Assessment reports in local languages. The Petitioners contended that scientific objections raised during consultations were not meaningfully addressed. The Respondents deny these allegations, asserting strict compliance with procedural requirements.
15. The Petitioners also alleged that the land diversion violated Section 2 of the Forest Conservation Act, 1980, on the ground that the term "land" satisfied the dictionary meaning of "forest" based on its ecological characteristics, notwithstanding the absence of formal notification. Additionally, it was alleged that the projects threatened endemic flora and fauna protected under the Biological Diversity Act, 2002, and that consultations with the State Biodiversity Board were inadequate.
16. Certain rural and tribal communities residing in the vicinity allege dispossession of traditional lands without adequate compensation or rehabilitation, claiming violation of Article 300A of the Constitution and the Right to Fair Compensation and Transparency in Land Acquisition, Rehabilitation and Resettlement Act, 2013. The Respondents denied these allegations, stating that land acquisition, where applicable, and was carried out in accordance with law, and stated that compensation was determined on the basis of the prevailing market value, while that rehabilitation and resettlement benefits were extended to eligible affected families.
17. Aggrieved by the approvals granted by the state authorities, allegedly in reliance upon the legal position articulated in *Green Earth Forum v. Union of Bharatavarsh & Ors*, and alleging violation of their fundamental rights, the Petitioners have instituted the present writ petition under Article 32 of the Constitution of Bharatavarsh.

# MOOT PROPOSITION

## NOTES

1. All laws of Bharatavarsh are *pari materia* with the laws of India. All names, places, and entities are fictitious and created solely for academic purposes.
  2. The judgment in *Green Earth Forum v. Union of Bharatavarsh & Ors.* shall be treated as binding law and its validity is not under challenge in the present proceedings.
  3. The High-Level Expert Committee report has not been challenged separately.
  4. The parties are free to frame issues arising from the facts. No additional facts may be assumed; however, the total number of issues shall be four.

# RULES AND REGULATIONS

## 1.ELIGIBILITY CRITERIA

1.1. The Competition is open to all students presently pursuing LL.B. courses (5 years or 3 years) from any Institution/ College/ University recognized by the Bar Council of India.

1.2. Students enrolled in postgraduate or diploma programmes shall not be eligible to participate in this Competition.

1.3. The Team shall comprise of three members of which two shall be designated as Speakers and the third member shall be the Researcher.

## 2.REGISTRATION AND CONFIRMATION

### 2.1: GENERAL

2.1.1. Each team shall register for the competition by filling the online provisional form before 15<sup>th</sup> March, 2026 (11:59 pm) and Final registration forms the latest by 18<sup>th</sup> March, 2026 (11:59 PM).

2.1.2. The Organizers will communicate the acceptance of the provisional registration and the final registration form for the completion of registration formalities through email. The teams are encouraged to complete the registration form at the earliest possible.

2.1.3. The registration form requires teams to specify the roles of each individual member. Once registered, a team will not be permitted to vary the composition of the team in any manner. Changes, if any, may only be made with the express permission of the administrators (at their discretion), if due reason is shown for the same.

2.1.4. Only 16 Teams on the basis of first come first serve shall be registered. However, the Organizers shall reserve the discretion to increase the number of teams.

2.1.5. The duly filled registration form must be submitted at the registration desk on the day of inauguration (17th April 2026).

# **RULES AND REGULATIONS**

## **2.2. REGISTRATION FEES**

2.2.1. The registration fees :

- Without Accommodation is Rs. 4000/- (Rupees Four Thousand Only).
- Accommodation- with additional charges.

2.2.2. All teams must attach a scanned copy of the e-transfer receipt in the Registration form. There shall be no refund of the registration fee under any circumstance.

2.2.3. Once a team is registered, a team code shall be assigned to it by the administrators. This team code will serve as their unique identifier throughout the competition. Any team that fails to send the details of the payment of fees shall not be allocated a team code.

## **3. PAYMENT DETAILS**

3.1. The registration fee payable for the competition as per Rule 2.2.1 is Rs. 4000 (Rupees Four thousand Only) per team. Teams must transfer the amount through NEFT or online to

## **4.DRESS CODE**

4.1. Male Participants shall wear a full suit – comprising of a black formal blazer and trousers, full sleeved white shirt and formal footwear.

4.2. Female Participants shall wear Western or Indian formals with blazers and formal footwear.

# RULES AND REGULATIONS

## 5.MISCELLANEOUS

- 5.1. The Teams shall take the facts of the Moot Problem as final.
- 5.2. Language for this competition shall be in English (for all rounds).
- 5.3. The registered participants shall maintain discipline throughout the Competition. Any breach of the same may lead to disqualification of the team from the competition. The decision of the organizers in this regard shall be final.

## 6.MEMORIAL

6.1. Each Team shall prepare Memorials in support of both the Petitioner/ Appellant and the Respondent. Soft Copies of the Memorials shall be in pdf format titled “Team Code- P/A” (for the Petitioner/Appellant) and “Team Code- R”(for the Respondent) which shall be mailed to not later than [mootcourtcommittee@bcwclc.edu.in](mailto:mootcourtcommittee@bcwclc.edu.in) 11:59 pm on 04th April 2026, beyond which no Memorials shall be entertained.

Clarifications regarding the moot proposition must be mailed to [mootcourtcommittee@bcwclc.edu.in](mailto:mootcourtcommittee@bcwclc.edu.in) which will be entertained only until 11:59 pm of 21st March, 2026, the same shall be released on the 22nd March, 2026.

6.2. The ‘Team Code’ allotted by the Organizers, shall be mentioned on the Cover Page of the Memorials of the Petitioner/Appellant and Respondent. For example, if the assigned Team Code is 99, the Team shall title the Memorial as “99-P/A” and “99-R” respectively.

6.3. Two (2) Hard copies of each of the Memorials of the Petitioner/Appellant and the Respondent shall reach the Organizers not later than 8th of April 2026, beyond which no Memorials shall be entertained.

6.4. In Addition, Six (6) Hard Copies of each of the Memorials for both the sides shall be submitted on 16th April 2026, at the time of orientation.

6.5. The Hard Copies of the Memorials shall bear a cover page in conformity with the following scheme: Petitioner/ Appellant- Blue; Respondent- Red.

6.6. Teams shall cite authorities in the Memorials using footnotes following the Harvard Bluebook (21st Edition).

6.7. Once the Memorials are submitted, no additions, modifications, supplements, etc., shall be entertained.

# RULES AND REGULATIONS

6.8. The Cover Page of each Memorial shall contain the following information:

- a) The Team Code in the upper right hand corner shall be in compliance with Rule 6.2.
- b) Name of the Court resolving the dispute.
- c) Year of the Competition.
- d) Name of the Case, and
- e) The party for which the Memorial has been prepared.

6.9. The Memorials shall contain the following:

- a) Cover Page
- b) Table of Contents
- c) Table of Cases
- d) List of Abbreviations
- e) Index of Authorities (Only Statutes, International Instruments or Constitutional Law)
- f) Statement of Jurisdiction
- g) Statement of Facts (not exceeding 2 pages)
- h) Issues Raised
- i) Summary of Arguments (not exceeding 2 pages)
- j) Arguments Advanced (not exceeding 20 pages)
- k) Prayer (not exceeding 1 page)
- l) Bibliography (list of Books and Articles)
- m) Webliography

6.10. All the contents of the Memorial (including the preliminary pages) shall be typed on 'A4 sheets'. The Font shall be "Times New Roman" and in addition, the Participants shall adhere to the following specifications:

- a) Font Size: 12;
- b) Line Spacing: 1.5;
- c) Headings: 14;
- d) Body of Text: Justified.

6.11. For Footnotes, the formatting specifications are: Font type: Times New Roman; Font Size: 10; Single Spacing; Paragraph Spacing: 0; and the Body of the Text: Justified.

6.12. The fixtures shall be determined by the draw of lots and there shall be exchange of Memorials between the respective opposing Teams, prior to the Quarter-Final, Semi-final and Final Rounds.

# RULES AND REGULATIONS

## 7.ANONYMITY OF TEAMS

7.1. The Teams shall not reveal their identity throughout the Competition in any form, except by means of the Team Code allotted to them.

7.2. The Memorials and materials presented to the Bench shall not reveal the identity of the Team in any form and should not bear the logo, name etc., of the Institution/College/University represented.

## 8.PENALTY

8.1. Any Memorial violating any of the above mentioned specifications shall be penalized according to the scheme as follows :

8.2. Any decision of the Organizers regarding the deductions shall be final and the same is not open to challenge.

# RULES AND REGULATIONS

## 9. PRELIMINARY ROUNDS :

9.1. Each Team shall argue twice in the Preliminary Rounds, once for Petitioner/ Appellant and once for the Respondent.

9.2. Oral Arguments: Each Preliminary Round shall consist of Sixty (60) minutes of arguments.

9.3. Each Team shall allocate its 30 minutes between the two Speakers, each Speaker having 15 minutes.

9.4. The top 8 teams based on their scores shall advance to the Quarter-Final Rounds.

9.5. In case of a tie, the team's Memorial marks shall be added to the scores of the Oral Rounds and consequently, the Team with higher marks shall progress to the Quarter-Final Rounds.

9.6. If the tie persists then it shall be broken by flipping of a coin.

9.7. The detailed breakup of marking criteria are as follows:

# **RULES AND REGULATIONS**

## **10. QUARTER-FINAL ROUNDS**

10.1. The timing rules governing the Preliminary Rounds shall be applicable to the Quarter-Final Rounds.

10.2. The marking criteria of these rounds shall be as per Rule 9.7.

10.3. By means of knock-out, Four (4) teams shall advance to the Semi-Final Rounds.

## **11. SEMI-FINAL ROUNDS**

11.1. Each Semi-Final Round shall consist of 90 minutes of arguments.

11.2. Each Team shall get a total time of 45 minutes to present their arguments.

11.3. Each Speaker shall get a maximum of 22.5 minutes to present the case, which shall include the time for rebuttal/ surrebuttal, as the case may be, and the same may be allowed at the judges' discretion.

11.4. The marking criteria of the Semi-Final Rounds shall be as per Rule 9.7.

11.5. By means of knock-out, Two (2) teams shall advance to the Final Round.

## **12. FINAL ROUND**

12.1. The timing rules governing the Semi-Final Rounds shall be applicable to the Final Round and the marking criteria shall be as per Rule 9.7.

# RULES AND REGULATIONS

## 14. FOOD AND ACCOMMODATION

14.1. Teams arriving by flight, train or bus shall arrange their own transportation to the Venue of the Competition.

14.2. The Organizers shall not bear travel expenses of the Participants.

14.3. Accommodation will be provided only on request with additional charges.

14.4. The Campus is eco-friendly and is in compliance with Swachh Bharat initiative undertaken by the Government of India. Thus, the Participants shall cooperate with the Organizers in keeping the Place of Accommodation and Campus clean at all times by discarding wastes in appropriate dustbins.
